How did Christo create art?

Christo began creating art early on, inspired by his parents' bohemian social circle, and was encouraged by several professors from the Academy of Fine Arts who would frequent the family home to visit his parents.

We round up eight of Christo and Jeanne-Claude's most arresting temporary art interventions from the past 50 years.

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True to their belief in public accessibility, Christo and Jeanne-Claude made their installations free to experience, financing them independently through the sale of Christo's preparatory drawings and ...

On the night of June 27, 1962, Jeanne-Claude and Christo began assembling their first major outdoor project:

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an obstacle on a narrow street in Paris's Latin Quarter created from 89 oil drums turned onto ...

Christo and Jeanne-Claude's biggest works--many of them made after years of bureaucratic wrangling and construction, and all of them temporary--are ranked below by the amount of fabric used.

Together, the duo created monumentally-scaled sculptures and interventions which often utilized the technique of draping or wrapping large portions of existent landscapes, buildings, and ...

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
